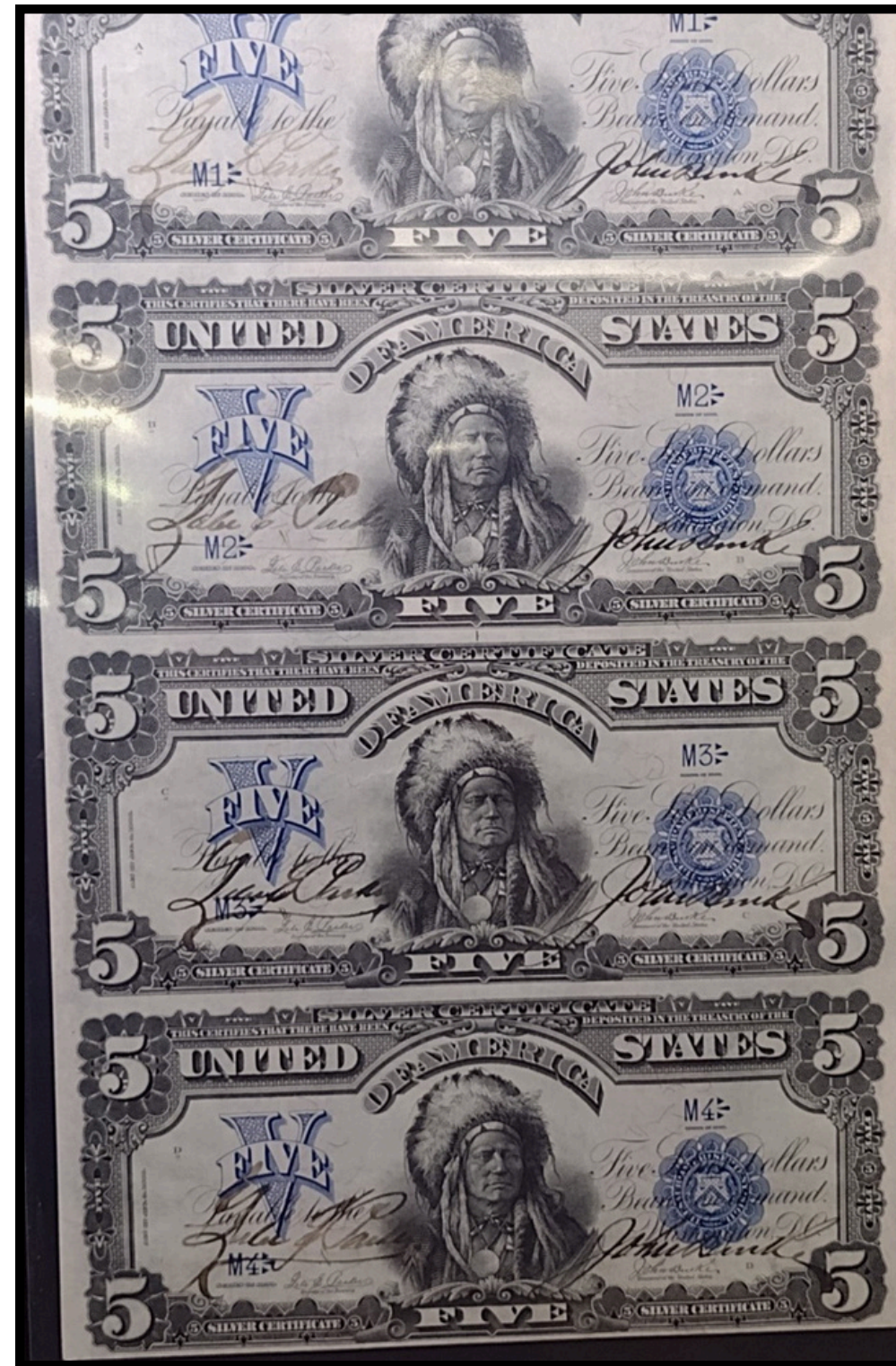

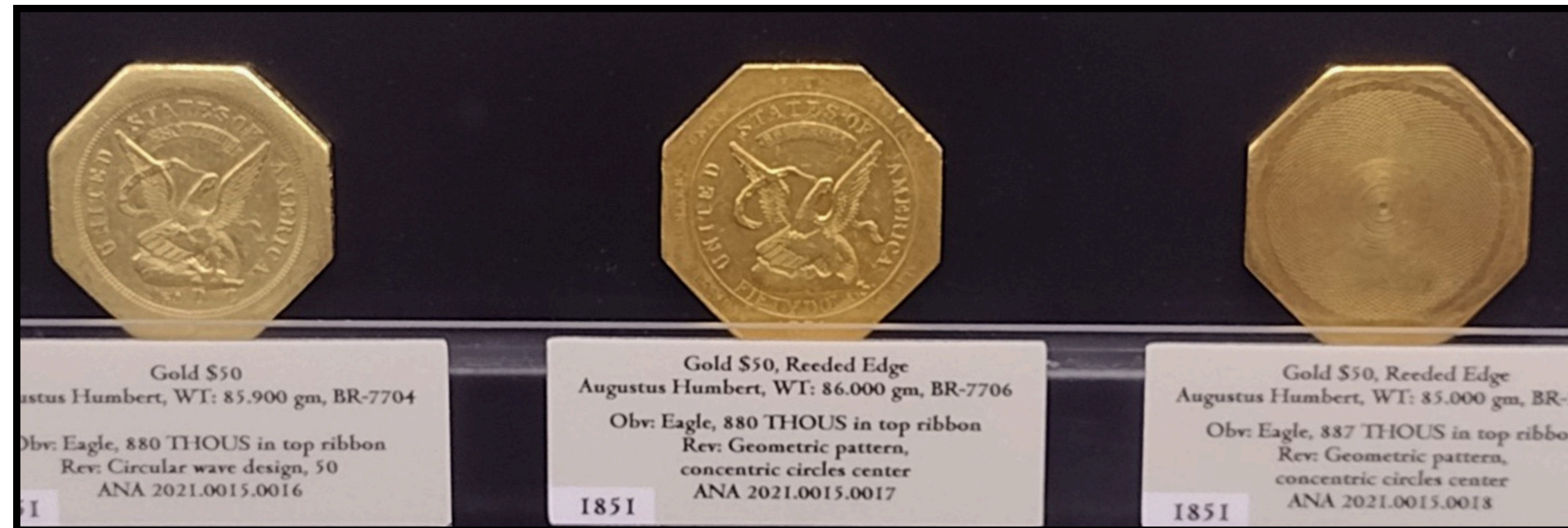
- One of the Money Museums at the ANA.

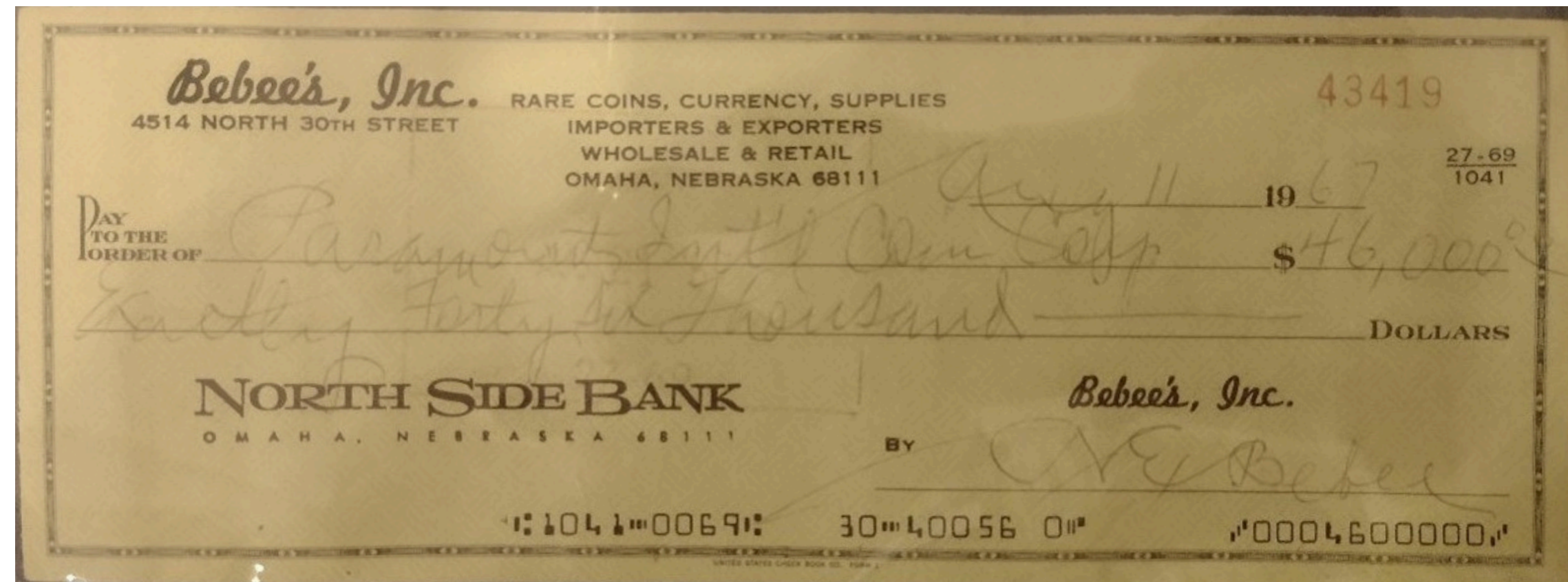
THE McDERMOTT/BEBEE SPECIMEN

J.V. McDermott was the leading advertiser in *Numismatic Scrapbook Magazine* for many years. In each advertisement, he would preface his coin listing with some discussion, often about the 1913 Liberty Head nickel. He was fond of carrying it in his pocket and taking it out at convention hotel bars and asking anyone if they would like to see a “\$5000 nickel” telling everyone that it was one of just five known. After McDermott died in 1966, the nickel was sold at auction to Aubrey E. Bebee. In 1989 Aubrey and his wife, Adeline, having retired from their coin business, donated it to the ANA Money Museum.

United States Coin Grading One:

- Two instructors; one former and one current employee for PCGS grading company.
- Discussed the theory and practice of commercial coin grading.
- Practiced grading coins by looking at approximately 250 coins over the duration of four days.
- The students were given one minute to examine each coin to determine its grade. After 20 coins, the instructors would go over the details of each coin, give the grade and the reasoning behind the grade.
